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was wearing Royal Scots Guards uniform of khaki tunic and plaid breeches and Prince George, the uniform of a Lieutenant in the Royal Navy. Premier Baldwin was in regulation morning dress.

During the afternoon Their Royal Highnesses played golf at Boischatel and the party were later entertained at tea by Mrs. W. G. Power and the Hon. W. G. Power who had just returned from Europe on the *Empress of Australia*.

The state dinner given at Government House, Saturday evening by the Lieut. Governor, and his daughter, Mrs. McKenna was a delightful function marked with simplicity and dignity. Silver bowls of summer flowers made the long table attractive and the wide open French windows and lovely lawns strewn with Chinese lanterns were delightful additions to this unusually charming old manoir.

Dinner was served at eight o'clock and those present included His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, His Royal Highness Prince George, the Prime Minister of Great Britain and Mrs. Baldwin, Hon. L. A. Taschereau, Prime Minister of the Province of Quebec and Mrs. Taschereau, Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, Prime Minister of the Dominion of Canada, Hon. Lucien Cannon and Mrs. Cannon, Sir Lomer and Lady Gouin, Hon. J. E. Perrault and Mrs. Perrault, Sir Charles and Lady Fitzpatrick, the dignitaries of the Church, the members of the federal and provincial cabinets the members of the suites of Their Royal Highnesses and the Premier of Great Britain.

At ten-thirty the receiving line formed in the Drawing Room and the Lieut. Governor and Mrs. McKenna presented to Their Royal Highnesses a number of guests who had been bidden to the intimate reception which followed the state dinner. A number of Quebec's younger set had been invited and five debutantes made their initial bows. They included Miss Yvette McKenna who is a charming girl reflecting her mother's pretty manner and tact, and who wore a pink gown heavily fringed in crystal. Miss McKenna is the granddaughter of the Lieut.-Governor. Miss Doreen and Miss Patricia Power, two sisters were gowned alike in white beaded crepe. They are daughters of the Hon. W. G. and Mrs. Power. Miss Yvette St. Jacques, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. St. Jacques and a niece of the Lieut.-Governor, wore a pretty frock of silver net over white crepe. Mlle. Marie Papineau, another dainty debutante, is the daughter of Col. Papineau, A.D.C. She wore a chiffon frock in Rosee Flamme.

Among the gowns noted were Mrs. Stanley Baldwin's of black crepe with lovely Chinese shawl and a pearl and diamond Spanish comb in her hair. Mrs. Baldwin was also wearing several decorations including the O.B.E. Mrs. McKenna wore white crepe heavily embroidered with pearls and rhinestones. Mrs. Lucien Cannon made a pretty picture in a white georgette and sequin gown with a great ostrich fan of Belgian blue. Mrs. Perrault was a charming figure in a robe de style of fuchsia red and old blue. Mrs. Fagen's gown of apple green panne velvet was a lovely simple thing. Mme. Taschereau was stunning in pink with touches of silver and an ermine cloak. Mrs. R. P. Kernan was pretty in blue and silver wrap with silver gown trimmed

with rhinestones. Mrs. Frank Clarke wore cloth of gold and her guest, Mrs. John Holt of Montreal was in white. Mlle. Susan Fiset wore a white gown beaded in white with touches of green; Sir Eugene Fiset's daughters Mlle. Aline in old blue and silver and Mlle. Gabrielle in pink came up from Rimouski for the occasion. Sir Richard Turner's daughter, Miss Evelyn Turner is a charming girl, who wore a green beaded frock. Mlle. Marcel Paradis wore rose and gold. Miss Babs Drayton of Ottawa wore a misty gown of powder blue and flesh georgette. Mrs. A. B. McEwen, blue crepe romaine and silver shoes. Mme. Duchatel de Montereuge in powder blue and silver. Mrs. Gerard Power was stately in black and silver. For the evening functions Their Royal Highnesses and Mr. Baldwin and most of the gentlemen of their suites wore regulation evening dress.

The intimate reception took the form of casual dancing to music provided by the orchestra of the *Empress of Australia* and as the evening was warm the French doors were swung wide and the porches were delightful rendezvous; while many entirely forsook the dancing to stroll in the lovely gardens which were gay with colored lights and Chinese lanterns. Supper was served in the conservatory, while one of the small drawing rooms was reserved for Their Royal Highnesses.

Sunday morning Their Royal Highnesses attended by Admiral Halsey and General Trotter attended service in the Cathedral of the Holy Trinity. They occupied the Royal Pew in the left hand gallery which is marked by the British coat of arms and crossed Union Jacks. This old church was built in 1804 by George III and has been intimately connected with the life of the English population since the beginning of the occupation. The late Edward VII sat in the same pew, and the present King occupied it when he and the Queen visited Canada as the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York in 1900. The service was beautiful and as the prayers were read it seemed that the words "and Edward Prince of Wales and all the Royal family" took on new significance. There was no sermon and when in lieu of it Bishop Williams stepped to the chancel railing and said "We take great pleasure in again welcoming your Royal Highness to Canada and we welcome all this goodly company," which included Mr. and Mrs. Baldwin and many distinguished visitors, it was very beautiful. When we saw these words bring a wave of color to the Prince of Wales' face our hearts went out to him and he seemed just that much more "our Prince" and many eyes were filled with unshed tears, and many an unspoken blessing followed him.

The service was over, Their Royal Highnesses quickly left the cathedral. They were followed immediately by Mr. and Mrs. Baldwin and there was quite a quiet little demonstration as their car slowly proceeded through the crowd assembled in the cathedral close. Immediately after arriving at the *Quai du Roi*, for the trip to Montreal, following a few official adieux the party preceded by Their Royal Highnesses went aboard. The princes were both wearing navy blue suits soft gray felt hats and brown buckskin Oxfords and looked very fit in spite of the arduous programme they had filled.
