THEIR MOUNTAINS.

THE mountains are few. There are, however, quite a number of eminences, not exactly to be rated under the name of mountains and I am sure cannot be called level earth. There are many heights along the southern shore of Lake Superior and some in the north to which the title of mountains is applied. There are numerous lofty peaks of granite, a short distance back from the shore of Lake Huron and the northern shore of Lake Ontario. I have walked over that part of the country for many days in succession and have seen nothing but these granite hills, most of which are destitute of wood. There was a time when they were well covered with trees that took root in the clefts, but they were all destroyed by fire and the peaks to-day present a very barren and in attractive appearance.

The Porcupine Mountains near La Point, can be seen, in a clear day, at a distance of eighty miles from their base. One of the grandest sights I have ever witnessed, was a view of this range of mountains, at a distance, when the morning sun was rising above their
